

The project application was submitted for approval at the next board meeting on 23 September - so fingers crossed. If given the ok we should have the refurbishment work completed prior to Christmas and the walls in place by March 2013.

30 June-1 July 2012







# A Brief History of the Forming of the Commando Gunners

29 Field Regiment Royal Artillery consisting of 8 Alma, 79 Kirkee and 145 Maiwand Bty's RA were serving in Cyprus on an Emergency Internal Security Tour from June 1957 to May 1960. On completion of the tour the Regiment were embarked on the Troopship HMS Devonshire bound for the Regiments new home – the Royal Citadel in Plymouth.


After settling into their new home, 8 Alma Battery were preparing to go on a 72-hour leave pass around the beginning of April 1961 when the BBC World Service announced trouble had flared up in the Middle East Iraq was preparing to invade the relatively unknown small country of Kuwait. All leave was immediately cancelled and the Battery was issued with tropical clothing. Before departing we said our farewells to mates who were not coming with us. Many of the lads left behind were some of the last National Servicemen who had also served in Cyprus and were being de-mobbed. It was an honour to have served with these men. It was sad that it was the end of an era for National Service, which ran from 1939 to 1961.



Over the following weekend we were transported to RAF Lyneham and flown out to Kuwait via Bahrain. Within a couple of days the Battery were issued with 25 Pounder Field Guns from storage in Bahrainthese guns were probably last used in North Africa during WW2 and were not exactly in tip top condition. we were also issued with civilian trucks to tow the guns. The Battery, 42 Royal Marine Commando and other units deployed into the desert along the border with Iraq. Over the next few months the politicians began to negotiate and the Middle East began to settle down. By September 1961 we were moved out of Kuwait and into a transit camp in Aden.

As we all know the Army Commandos were formed in 1940 and disbanded in 1945-46 and rumours were abound that the Regiment was to change its role to a Commando Regiment. Possibly the first Army Commandos since WW2, following the re-organisation of 3 Commando Brigade RM. In October 1961 we boarded the troopship HMS Oxfordshire en-route from Hong Kong to the UK. It was during this time that it was deemed that not all members of the unit would be suitable for the new Commando role and once confirmed these personnel were to be posted on arrival back in the UK. HMS Oxfordshire was diverted and we arrived back in Plymouth at the end of October 1961, disembarking in Plymouth Sound onto large pontoon barges and being greeted by HM Customs at Millbay Docks. After a thorough search we were allowed to go on some well- earned disembarkation leave.

The first Commando Batteries to be formed were 79 Kirkee Cdo Light Bty RA and 145 Maiwand Cdo Light Bty RA, both being equipped with the new 105mm Pack Howitzer, 8 Bty

being part of the HQ Bty. 29 Cdo Light Regt RA now being formed as 2 x Cdo Btys and a HQ Bty. In July-August 1962, 79 Cdo Light Bty RA were posted to Singapore for a 3-year tour of duty, the Royal Citadel was now occupied by the now reformed 8 Cdo Light Bty RA and 145 Cdo Light Bty RA The Royal Citadel, Plymouth was now the home of '29 Commando' and would remain so for the next 50 years.

Reporting back to the Royal Citadel in January 1962-by which time the Regiments strength had reduced by 25%, we began training with other members of the Regiment and others who had been posted in to form the new 29 Commando Light Regiment RA. A small advanced party of PTIs' and training staff had been sent to CTCRM Lympstone to get trained so they could train up the remainder of the Regiment. The remainder started training in earnest in The Royal Citadel and on the moors during January and February of 1962, the days were long and the nights cold not a good time to be on the moor. Eventually we moved to CTCRM Lympstone and on 16 March 1962, the completion date for the first Commando Course, those that had passed were awarded the coveted Green Beret. By now Army Commandos were back in a Commando Brigade for the first time since the end of WW2.

## 60th Anniversary of our wonderful Commando Memorial

This year is the sixtieth that the Commando Memorial has stood 'on the hill' overlooking the River Spean valley with a view of Ben Nevis. The Memorial is a Category A listed monument, dedicated to the men of the original British Commando Forces raised during World War II. Situated around a mile from Spean Bridge village, it overlooks the training areas of the Commando Basic Training Centre, established in 1942 at Achnacarry Castle. Unveiled in 1952 by the Queen Mother, it has become one of Scotland's best-known monuments,



"On a hill in the heart of the country where they did their training a memorial was raised. A memorial at once striking yet simple. Three gigantic bronze figures of Commando Soldiers, in cap comforters and SV climbing boots, facing up to the elements", "Is it just another monument - another Glenfinnan - to another lost cause? 

One moving event that took place was the presentation of a commemorative 29 Cdo Regt RA - 50th Medal to the families of fallen comrades; the Medals being organised, paid and presented by members of the Plymouth Branch



# Other Interesting or Amusing Stuff!

#### Standing Orders for Rogers' Rangers (Major Robert Rogers)

logers' Rangers was an independent company of colonial militia, attached to the British Army during the Seven Years War called the French and Indian War in the United States). The unit was informally trained by Major Robert Rogers (an artists impression at photo on right) as a rapidly deployable light infantry force tasked with reconnaissance and conducting special erations against distant targets. Their military tactics were so bold and effective that the unit became the chief scouting unit of British Crown forces in the late 1750s. The British valued them highly for gathering intelligence about the enemy.

A fictional version of Robert Rogers' 'Rules of Ranging' taken from Kenneth Roberts novel 'Northwest Passage'.

- Don't forget nothing.
- 2. Have your musket clean as a whistle, hatchet scoured, sixty rounds powder and ball, and be ready to march at a minute's
- When you're on the march, act the way you would if you was sneaking up on a deer. See the enemy first.

  Tell the truth about what you see and what you do. There is an Army depending on us for correct information. You can lie to all you please when you tell other folks about the Rangers, but don't never lie to a Ranger or Officer.
- Don't never take a chance you don't have to.
- When we're on the march we march single file, far enough apart so one shot can't go through two men.
- If we strike swamps, or soft ground, we spread out abreast, so it's hard to track us.
- When we march, we keep moving till dark, so as to give the enemy the least possible chance at us.
- When we camp, half the party stays awake while the other half sleeps.
- 10. If we take prisoners, we keep 'em separate till we have had time to examine them, so they can't cook up a story between 'em.
- 11. Don't ever march home the same way. Take a different route so you won't be ambushed.12. No matter whether we travel in big parties or little ones, each party has to keep a scout 20 yards ahead, twenty yards on each flank and twenty yards in the rear, so the main body can't be surprised and wiped out.
- 13. Every night you'll be told where to meet if surrounded by a superior force.

- 15. Don't sleep beyond dawn. Dawn's when the French and Indians attack.

- 17. If somebody's trailing you, make a circle, come back onto your own tracks, and ambush the folks that aim to ambush you. Don't stand up when the enemy's coming against you. Kneel down. Hide behind a tree.
- 19. Let the enemy come till he's almost close enough to touch. Then let him have it and jump out and finish him with your hatchet.






